Golden Square Bicentennial Park Landscape Masterplan

Consultation Phase Two – 13 February to 6 March 2023

A draft masterplan was developed based on the results of an initial round of consultation held in August 2022, and presented to the community to test its recommendations. This report provides the consultation results, analysis and outcomes that will be applied to finalise the draft masterplan.

Background

The draft masterplan was developed by Jeavons Landscape Architects, based on an analysis of the existing site conditions and the community values captured from the first round of consultation in 2022. The draft was presented to the community through Council's Your Say Yarra (YSY) page, officers also made themselves available to go through the design in more detail and answer any questions at a face-to-face session held in the park.

Four questions were asked in the online survey about the draft masterplan, to test and refine the ideas presented.

- 1. What do you like about the masterplan?
- 2. How could the masterplan be improved?
- 3. What are your thoughts on replacing the ageing rotunda?
- 4. Do you have any other comments?

The draft masterplan used for the second round of consultation can be seen in Appendix 1.

Summary of engagement

The phase 2 survey was live on the YSY page from 13 February to 6 March.

- Online survey though YSY 38 Contributions
- Direct email responses 2 received

Face to face session on Saturday 25 February from 10am to 12pm

- 16 local residents dropped in to provide comments
- Cr Herschel and Cr Landes attended

Survey results

The questions in the survey required long form answers. All the responses have been read by one person, then summarised and themed accordingly. The summarised results are shown in the tables below and include comments received on site and from the emails received.

Outcomes

Support for the project outweighs opposition to it, and the draft masterplan will be finalised in its current configuration with minor modifications made. Suggestions made around specific aspects of the draft will be implemented in the detail design phase.

Low level planting will be implemented in the proposed garden beds and maintained to ensure sightlines and safety are not compromised.

Outcomes

The timing and delivery of projects was the main concern raised by residents in the survey and those who attended the pop-up session. Implementation for the masterplan is based on the annual budget cycle and we will continue to apply for funding to realise the recommendations of the masterplan.

The development of a lighting plan will be added to the list of actions for the masterplan.

The playground upgrade will be moved to the short-term list.

To preserve the amenity of the park, not all new infrastructure requests can be fulfilled. A basketball court, a fenced area for dogs and toilets are not seen as suitable components for a park of this size.

CPTED principles will be used in the detailed design and delivery of the masterplan to ensure safety is considered in every aspect of the design, from the planting beds to pathways and the playground.

3. What are your thoughts on replacing the ageing rotunda?


If the plan is endorsed, it will be used as a basis for capital works planning and budget bids in future years.


Projects from the adopted masterplan will be implemented as funding becomes available.


Some of the works such as the playground upgrade or rotunda renewal will require further community engagement before they are implemented.


Comments included in this round of analysis will be considered during future works.

Draft Masterplan presented for community consultation

Landscape Master Plan Vision

The Landscape Master Plan has been developed to guide the future improvements and ongoing maintenance of Golden Square Park to include:

- Retaining Golden Square Park as a hidden urban green retreat for local community.
- A place for the community to gather and play.
- · Retaining the existing mixed tree planting character

The recommendations below reflect the results of the community consultation.

Recommendations - Short Term

Remediate the existing lawn area and improve path connection to the train station.



Playspace Redesign play space to improve accessibility, play value, shade, and offer a greater range of play opportunities for different ages and abilities. Include accessible play elements, routes and seating locations within the proposed play footprint. The existing mound is to be replaced with a lower mound to improve sight lines and reduce slip risk on steep surface.



06 Picnic Shelter and BBQ Improve the existing BBQ area with new picnic settings under a shelter, accessible BBQ unit and paved surface to improve access. The lawn area behind the proposed shelter provides a spill out area for larger gatherings.



Perimeter Planting Replace existing perimeter timber bollards with ground cover and shrub planting around the perimeter. The new garden beds aims to improve biodiversity and create a visual barrier around the park.

Recommendations - Long Term

Provide inclusive access to landscape amenities, upgrade and replace existing ageing infrastructure.



Main Shelter Replace existing rotunda with a contemporary shelter, providing plenty of seating and improved access under the shelter.

Quiet Space for Reflection
Create a space that provides an opportunity for quiet reflection. Include seating as part of furniture replacement program under existing shade trees

Recommendations - On going

Tree Planting

Continue to maintain and care for existing trees within the park. Consider removal of some existing trees to improve passive surveillance. Consider introducing deciduous trees within the reserve to improve biodiversity and options for all

What do you like about the Masterplan?

Reduced mound in the playground More shade BBQ areas

The master plan is based on improvements and the suggestions are pretty straight forward.

Overall I think the plan would be a good improvement to the existing area.

Refreshed space

The perimiter planting is nice. I've never liked how 'looked in on' i've felt when sitting in this park. Feels like people on the street and train station stare in.

The levelling of the lawn and improved drainage is important and if done right, will be a great addition. The pram crossings are good too as it will avoid the 'goat track' style cut through.

Improved pathway lighting - nights are dark early during winter and many people walking from burnley station cut through the park. It is poorly lit so some improvements would benefit a feeling of safety at night.

Fabulous to see this area refreshed and updated. Increase of vegetation is a must do to improve biodiversity and assist with air quality

I like the added vegetation, improved BBQ area and improvements to the playground.

I think it looks fantastic but would love it to happen sooner than existing timelines

It's good, improves on the current amenities.

I like the removal of bollards and plantings I like the covered seating over picnic table I like the idea of reflective seating Removal of some trees replaced with more appropriate tree planting Needs to be more aesthetic Renovate the gazebo

The changes will improve varied parts of the park and so have maximised positive impact for those using it. We deinitely need improved vegetation and walk ways and the ongoing maintenance afterwards.

I like the extra shrub planting and long term plan to improve the rotunda but I don't think the lawn needs to be improved. And the paths are fine as they are. The park is lovely as it is the playground was only recently upgraded.

Great but it needs adult exercise equipment- eg a pull-up bar

I like the improved seating and meals areas for small or larger gatherings.

New play equipment including some elements for older children and accessibility items sounds fantastic. Please have some sun shade too. The park is visited by many children. Please don't make it as high as the slide at Citizens Park, as that looks a bit unsafe. In-build trampolines are also popular like at Thomas St Reserve Playground in Hampton so we'd love to see that in there too. 3-4 swings (maybe 1 basket swing) would be great as often many kids are waiting.

This master plan is Ok.

Fantastic suggestions and agree

The design examples showing natural materials in the play area look fantastic - they would suit the character of the park, the perimeter planting will look great, upgrading the lawn is a must - it ranges from swamp to concrete throughout the year.

I'm very supportive. I like that you're not trying to do everything and it appears you'll keep it simple, which is very much in line with the existing character of the park. Please do not lose sight of this. I like the plan for the native flower beds around the perimeter and for improving the quality of the grass. Please note however that the high use of dogs in the park will likely degrade the grass and there is the never-ending issue of dog faeces.

Looks great! Upgrading the play space and bbg area with some shade will be good

How could the Masterplan be improved?

Addition of toilets Addition of basketball hoop

The Masterplan needs to include the replacement of the wooden posts that surround all park areas in Burnley especially the Golden Square Reserve. I have lived opposite of park for almost 2 years and I am staggered at the constant rate of replacement the surrounding park posts. It is very obvious that the posts are untreated or insufficiently treated for their current use. Over the past 18 months I have noted that the bases easily rot causing the posts to collapse. They are replaced with the same and continue to quickly rot and collapse again. It would be fair to state the the beneficiaries of this ongoing process are the contractors and the supplier(s). Your records will clearly support this point of contention. This is of no benefit to the residents and tax payers. Do the math and perhaps you may choose to better utilise available funds for future improvements. Perhaps the savings from this wastage could finance a sound proof fence along the railway line which is opposite the north side of the reserve.

Bring forward the works from 10 years. Prioritise the playground upgrade would be great to have a water play area, in ground trampolines, and overall better play equipment. Having the rotunda as part of the playground area would be nice to host kids birthday with oversight of playground.

Community garden and/or community fruiting trees

In regards to safety within the park I would like to query the replacing of the bollards fence with ground cover plants and shrubs in part to create a visual barrier around it.

If a visual barrier is created around the park then sight lines into the park and natural surveillance of the people using the park could be greatly reduced, if not done correctly.

Then I noted that the playground area mound is also to be reduced in height which also reduce the sight lines and natural surveillance from outside the park, especially when the shrubs on the exterior could be created a visual barrier.

In the past lighting of parks has been minimal to reduce the community from going into and using the facilities during the darkened hours as well to reduce the affect on animals within the environment. However the use of parks within inner Melbourne has changed and is often seen as an extension of peoples backyards and/or locations for socialising before or after work (shift workers), school etc. The lighting in the park which there appears to be only three lights in the whole park. Planting of trees to create shade is good for the daylight hours but can be a safety issue during the darkened hours as it can inhibit the spread of lighting and create much darker areas throughout the park.

In the City of Melbourne when there has been issues with sufficient lighting in parks the community use their mobile phones torch application to light the way/area for themselves. This has made some of them targets for robbery and theft.

I would suggest that a lighting plan be developed around the proposed changes to the park and its environment including the spaces and infrastructure.

Maintain a physical barrier/deterrent to cars driving onto the park. The perimeter bollards offer this already and could be painted. Improving biodiversity is not going to improve the health of the park nor the safety of persons within the park as you only propose a visual barrier. Introducing garden beds could be done within the perimeter, without removing a safety barrier to maintain both a physical and visual barrier.

Introducing a water efficient playground where water is recycled. Kids (and dogs) love the water fountain and playing in it but it wastes a lot of water. Playgrounds have been adopting the water well pumps that recycle the water which kids seem to love. This should be incorporated into the masterplan and playground improvement. (PS - keep the bins, keep the dog poo bags) - everyone in the community does the right thing -mostly.

Management of trees needs to be considered. the Fairy tree is an icon and needs preserving but the other trees are dotted species without much thought as some of these trees constantly drop limbs - causing a safety issue but also grow so tall that they obscure views (good or bad). The birds are great but the bats are not, so any berry producing trees should be avoided.

The concern is the duration of the masterplan, the short to mid-term items should be tackled in one tranche (with the exception of the lawn improvement) for cost efficiencies. With CoY approving so many developments, the population is set to in increase dramatically so the park will need improvement to cater for an increase in usage by both residents (think the 2 x developments at end of Gibdon st - i.e Burnley Maltings) and the commercial buildings of Australia Post and the recent submission next to Aus post along the Swan Street precinct.

Although toilets would be handy I fear vandalism and maintenance could be problematic.

The nearest toilets are in a restaurant (which don't generally accept public usage) and in the train station. When spending time with children at the playground this results in a long distance for a child that doesn't have much time when they realise they need the toilet.

A half basketball court to shoot hoops would be good

You need to build toilets.

Please add an enclosed / fenced dog exercise area. It is not safe to let dogs run around with no barrier between the park and the busy road.

Timeframe!!

This is urgent work needs to be gone now

Adding in something for the older kids ie a basketball hoop/shooting area in the rear part of the park thats currently underused

Needs a pull up bar

A small track around the edge of the gardens for people for enjoy the new garden edging you are planting and to walk laps of the park.

A nice vegetable garden for people to manage/ share would be a great idea. Eg burnley backyard.

The playground revamp is much needed and sooner than planned. Look at the level of development in the area. I'd like to see this within the next 12 months. We would like to see a same or larger sized playground. Ropes design photo looks wonderful for older kids!

1. The foot path at the corner of Parkvile and Gibdon Streets needs correcting. When you walk down Gibson Street and cross parkville street to get to the park, the cross over is not directly in front of you, but is two meter down Parkvlle street. This is very annoying for pam user and little kids on bike.

When you cross Gibdon st (at the corner of Gibdon and Parkville street) there is a crossover to get to the footpath but the crossover does not join the park path. You have to go on the footpath, go off onto the road junction in parkville street to then get onto the park path. As this is out of the way people just walk across the grass.

- 2. More seating around the BBQ area is recommended.
- 3. The paving under the rotunda is uneven and a trip hazzard.

Stupid idea to take 10 years, let's just do it within a year - why wait

By bringing forward the play area upgrade, we would be looking forward to this immensely, we would love to see this as soon as possible. Does the plan need to allow for new office workers (Australia Post etc under construction) looking for a lunch break?

Please make sure that when you upgrade the existing playground that you should try to maintain existing a footprint and not be tempted to expand it over a broader area. If you were to expanded over a broader area, I think that it would lose the proportion and the amenity of the park for other users. I noted in the example play equipment provided in your website that one of them was quite a tall piece of clay equipment, which I think would be a good solution for this site, rather than spreading out.

Please can you include water play for the children? Yarra parks have no water play and it's gets so hot during Summer. This would be loved by children and parents alike.

Is there any plan for toilets?

Toilets, water play for the kids (lacking in Yarra on hot days!)

A 10-year timeframe for full completion is outrageous. At worst I'd expect this plan to be implemented within 3 years if funding is not immediately available. Anything more says you are not taking on the job of improving the park seriously.

Add lighting to the area once it gets dark outside, and in the mornings. I find it guite scary and dangerous to be around.

Playground needs to be updated first and foremost

Please have some flowering plants and trees, not all green.

There is so much intervention - garden beds but no lights? Consultation clearly accounted for nothing

One thing I would like to see would be a half hard court. Basketball maybe. Something we can play on.

What are your thoughts on replacing the ageing rotunda in the future?

No issues

The rotunda can be enlarged and improved by being opened up instead of closed.

Happy to replace. Would be good to have it weatherproof for somewhere to go if it suddenly rains.

Modern materials and a bigger footprint

The rotunda should be preserved to be sympathetic to its heritage but it does need maintenance. The bluestone pavers are uneven which makes use of the space difficult for any people using it for parties, picnics.

If replaced, weather protection would need considering as the shape of the rotunda helps protect from most directions of wind/rain.

Modernising the structure and providing better accessibility is top priority it's a shame that this is in the longer (7-10yr) scope of works.

Email submission 1:

As a long term local resident of this precinct I'm extremely dismayed by the proposed Master Plan for our small local parkland.

The staff commented that the brief for this design would respect the community's earlier input. However, I see these plans are completely ignoring this.

Currently Golden Square is a modest open green space with good visablity from the surrounding streets and homes, offering a high level of community safety for those using this very popular area.

The proposed mass planting removes that very important visability and takes over much of our green open space that is frequented by many in the Community either to sit quietly in the sun or walk on the grass around the perimeter. Others prefer to occupy the central points watching their young children playing on the play equipment or the neighbours' dogs rushing around the central space of the park. All valid options.

With the new Aust Post building, Malt House redevelopment and proposed local town house developments, our small pocket of Burnley will require MORE OPEN GREEN GRASSY SPACE NOT LESS.

The current layout provides for a variety of uses but the proposed plans remove many of these options for quieter use for this community with the designer's mass over planting!

The much larger Burnley Park and Barkly Garden offer open space to the local neighbourhoods, sadly not on offer with the current Master Plan proposal here.

I would like the North West corner (Stawell St and Maddern Grove) to be modestly replanted (ASAP) with a variety of small flowering plants (my prefetence small decorative agapathnas). These plants require minimal care and will add florals and colour at this memorial corner. This will be an inexpensive decorative replanting in our neglected local pocket.

The upgrading of the gazebo needs to recognise the Heritage profile of the area, as the present structure does, admittedly its size is inadequate for our ever growing community. It may need to be reconstructured with a similar larger version, with a flat blue stone floor, not a with cheap concrete floor.

Yarra Council currently does not budget sufficiently to adequately care for Golden Square, a case in point being the memorial plaques obliterated by the tatty planting, infrequently trimmed.


For those residing in our small pocket of Burnley minimal expenditure from the Yarra Budget is allocated. This inequity is completely unacceptable.

By no means last the elm tree hasobvious diseased foliage that require immediate attention, this tree is significant as it was part of the former Burnley Primary


Email submission 2:

- 1. Along the side of the park that connects with Madden Grove. It would also be good if native trees were planted with them. le coner madden and Stawell Street.


